



This bespoke module teaches students how to facilitate P4C (Philosophy for Children) sessions and places them in a local primary school, working in teams to help young learners think deeply together.

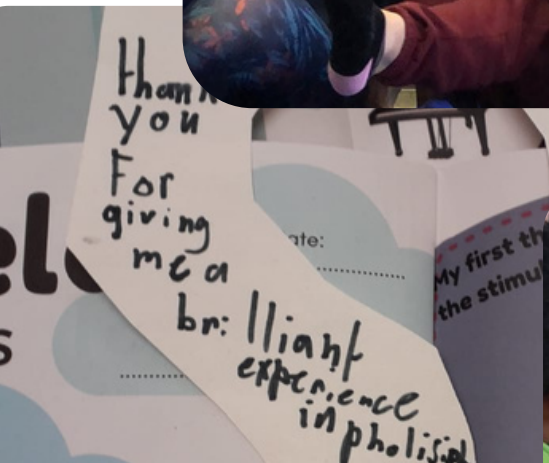
